

Important Vote on RVWARS Dues Scheduled for Dec. 15th Meeting

There has been much discussion at the past few monthly RVWARS meetings about the budget. More specifically our yearly dues income vs. our yearly expenses. I can't go into specific details here, but you may certainly obtain copies of the details from our Treasurer, Stan (WA2UET) on request. They are also available at the meetings.

Essentially, our expenses are about \$1100 a year MORE than our dues income. This hasn't been a problem thanks to the many small donations, and some very generous donations, as well as the fund raising events. However, we can't rely on an endless supply of donations, estate goods, and tag sale items to balance the budget.

A few ideas were passed around at the recent meetings. Such things as asking for more donations when collecting dues, reducing the insurance costs (which are minimum already), and a few others. But essentially what it comes down to is that we need to raise the membership dues in order to assure continued success as an organization in the future.

Per the Constitution and By-laws of the organization, the following proposal was submitted in writing, and discussed at the November meeting. A vote will be

held at the December 15th meeting at the Club House, 7pm.

(Please note: current 2009 dues will not be increased - Dues collected after April 1 2009 will be for 2010)

PROPOSED DUES
(Effective 2010)
Individual Member = \$25/yr
Family Membership = \$30/yr
Full time students = \$5/yr (No change)
Active Military = Free (No change)

This will bring the shortfall to about \$500 per year which we are hoping to be able to more easily manage with continued fundraising.

Thanks to ALL who make the club a success, and assist in keeping Amateur Radio alive.


A CHRISTMAS EVE RADIO STORY

The year was 1906. Marconi had already invented the wireless telegraph and land and sea communication networks were being established. DeForest was attempting to perfect his "audion" (triode) tube.

Reginald Fessenden, a Canadian inventor and Ernst Alexanderson, a Swedish immigrant, were hard at work in Fessenden's Massachusetts laboratory. They developed a mechanical device to "alternate" a continuous radio wave. The device consisted of a huge disc that revolved at 20,000 rpm. They had connected it to a transmitter and a microphone, and discovered that they could "modulate" a radio signal!

On Christmas Eve, as wireless operators at land stations and aboard ships off the Massachusetts coast diligently maintained their radio watches by listening to the familiar Morse code signals; they were startled when they suddenly heard voices in their headphones! They listened spellbound. Then, they heard a woman singing! Finally, they heard someone playing a violin! It was Fessenden himself...playing the sacred carol "O Holy Night". No longer would radio sounds be restricted to the "dit's" and "dah's" of the Morse code.

That's how it happened. Christmas Eve...Nineteen Hundred and Six.

Upon opening, I discovered a most wonderfully illustrated glossy color QSL certificate from a special event station contact I had forgotten about.
